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Assessment Policy

1. Introduction:

At Al Rushed American Private School, each student's achievements are continually assessed. Teachers use a variety of assessment techniques including testing for knowledge and skills, observations, portfolios of students' work, and analysis of books, projects, and practical work. Attitude, learning skills, social relationships, and efforts are considered equally important when looking at the overall development of the child.

Detailed descriptive reports are given to parents three times a year, and parent/ teacher meetings are also held to discuss each student's social and academic progress.

2. Assessment Strategies:

For an assessment to be effective, it should respond to students' needs, attitudes as well as social-emotional skills. That is why continuous formative and summative tools of assessment should be incorporated into our assessment programs. The following strategies will be employed:

A - Admission Assessment

This placement test is a preliminary judgment on the newly enrolled student's proficiency level. All new students sit for this test in addition to the personal interview and learning background information.

B - Diagnostic Assessment

It is a form of pre-assessment that allows a teacher to determine students' individual strengths, weaknesses, knowledge, and skills prior to instruction. It is primarily used to diagnose student difficulties and to guide lesson and curriculum planning. Teachers typically use this right before starting a new course, grade level or unit.

C - Formative Assessment

It refers to a wide variety of methods that teachers use to conduct in-process evaluations of student comprehension, learning needs, and academic progress during a lesson, unit, or course. Formative assessments help teachers identify concepts that students are struggling to understand, skills they are having difficulty acquiring, or learning

standards they have not yet achieved so that adjustments can be made to lessons, instructional techniques, and academic support. The general goal of formative assessment is to collect detailed

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information that can be used to improve instruction and student learning while it is happening. A formative assessment is rarely graded as it is an <u>assessment for learning</u>.


Examples of formative assessments include:

- Pop quizzes
- Reading checks
- Learning games
- Homework
- Discussion questions
- Hands-on activities

D - Summative Assessment

The goal of summative assessment is to evaluate student learning at the end of an instructional unit by comparing it against learning standards. A summative assessment is graded as it is an <u>assessment of learning</u>. Examples of summative assessments include:

- End of unit or chapter quizzes
- projects
- midterms
- End of term assessments
- End of year assessment



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E - Assessment through Communication/ Behavior

Supervisors collect data about learners' attitudes based on their observation and follow-up as well as teachers' feedback.

Passing Mark:

- The passing mark is 50% for grades (1-8), and 60% for grades (9-12).
- Only at the end of the year, the marks between (47-49) will be rounded up to 50 if the passing mark is 50%, and the marks between (57-59) will be rounded up to 60 if the passing mark is 60%.
- Students of grades (1-5) pass automatically to the next level.

F-Make-up Assessment

Students from Gr. 6 – 12:


- a) A student can sit for make-up assessments if he/she fails maximum in (3) subjects. In case of failure in more than (3) subjects, he/she has to repeat the same grade level.
- b) In case of failure in any of the make-up assessments, the student has to repeat the same grade level.
- c) Make-up assessments are conducted after the final assessment in the final term.

G - Missed Assessments

The students who miss any assessment during any term can sit for a re-assessment if they provide an acceptable document with a valid reason.

4. Al Rushed School Grading System

Al Rushed American Private School is following the American Curriculum. Our school uses a trimester calendar, in which the academic year is divided into three terms. Since we, at Al Rushed School, follow the American curriculum, our high school students earn one credit for a course that lasts all academic year. This credit is formally known as a Carnegie Unit. (A time-based standard, one Carnegie Unit (or credit) is awarded for every 120 hours of class time. The foundation translated this into one hour of instruction four- five days a week for 24 weeks.)

c. How Is It Calculated?

<u>1</u> credit hour = <u>120</u> study hours = <u>160</u> periods (<u>40</u> minutes of duration each) = <u>5</u> periods per week for <u>32</u> weeks per subject approximately

d. American High School Graduation Requirements:

A minimum of 28 credits are required for graduation in 4 years of high school.
